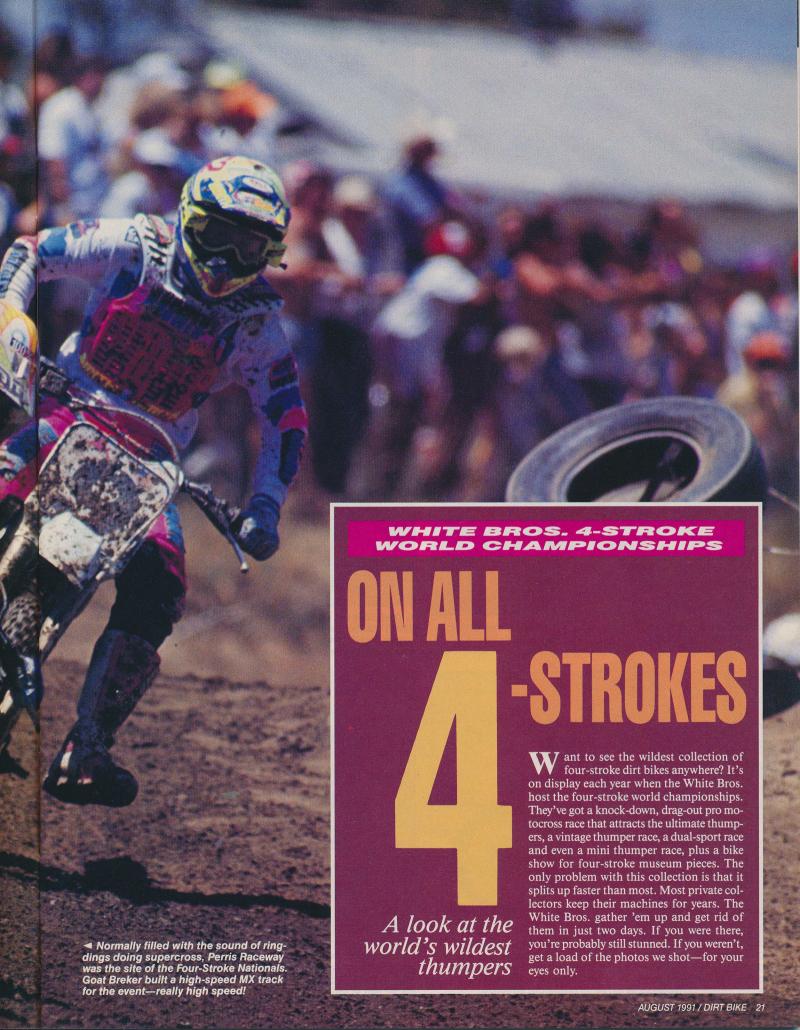

Ty Davis and the world's most effective used bike. ATK built two 450s for an assault on the 500 Nationals for their former factory rider, Greg Zitterkopf. Zit went to KTM and Zip Ty got a potent weapon for the world championship.



An '84 XL350. Doesn't look very much like an '84 XL, does it? George Smith, 100s rider, and White Bros., the source of most of the non-Honda items on the bike, obviously have more serious plans for the machine than Honda ever did. The White Bros. White Power suspension, at \$1700, is costly but effective.



In love? DIRT BIKE's XR250L grew up, with help from XRs Only. The extended-fin 280 top end and revalved and resprung suspension might just make this 280 a better 350-class dual-sport than a certain other popular 350 dual-sport. Stay tuned for the tell-all test of both bikes.

Street Fighter: What has a full-house race engine and a license plate? White Bros.' DR441S. This registered, street-legal machine mixed it up with the fastest four-strokes in the world in the Open Pro motocross race. It could have raced the dual-sport event, too, but White Bros. knows it's bad for business to roost good customers.



How sano was it? DC Fabrication's DRM500 was so sano it was scary. It's all Suzuki: '83 DR500 engine, '87 RM250 frame. If Suzuki started pumping these out tomorrow, we wouldn't complain.



White Bros. put on a four-stroke show for all ages at this year's world champion-ships. You could see everything from pushrods to pentroof heads in action.

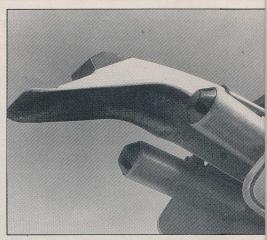

◄ Mini class winner Ray "Spike" Groom engineered an '87 RM-like frame tunnel into his Honda 121cc XR100-engined, KX bigwheel 80-framed mini to solve the intake plumbing problems. Race Tech solved the 200-lb. adult-rider-on-a-mini suspension problems. "These bikes are fun in the worst conditions; they just make you feel great. It's like listening to a Neil Sedaka album," Groom said.

◆ Chris Haines' DR435 is a rolling showcase for Baja Products, Haines' new Suzu-ki DR performance modification company. 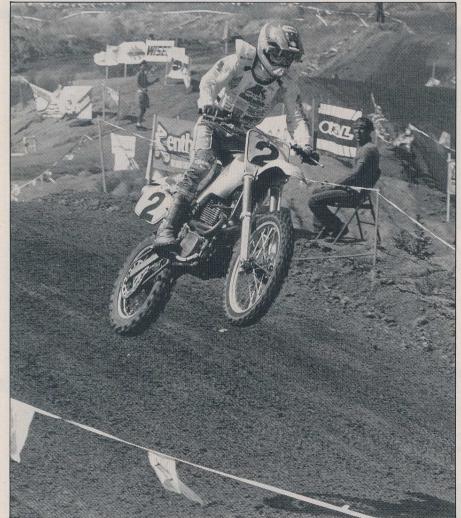






WHITE BROS. 4-STROKE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS





Ty Davis and Eric Kehoe were jumping huge distances from a takeoff point that was a rolling hill to lesser riders. At the speeds the leaders were going, it's odd they just didn't take off on the flat straight.

ATK's soil-shredding 500s claw their way around Perris Raceway's first turn in the first 500 Pro moto. Eric Kehoe (3) made it to the hairpin first, but Ty Davis (2) used the inside line to exit with the lead. Kehoe went down later in the moto after battling with Davis, who took the moto victory and the overall win.



DIRT BIKE's own Robert Rex grabbed a ride on Honda's experimental 200cc automatic transmission thumper. Rex disguised himself as a typical MOTOCROSS ACTION reader to sneak into the Honda pit. Rex earned a DIRT BIKE jersey for his effort.
